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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Desh Bhagat College, Bardwal-Dhuri which was started with the blessing of Sant Baba Ranjit Singh Ji Mullowal in 1982 got affiliated to Punjabi University Patiala with B. A.-I (Humanities). Headed by the buoyant energy, the faculty is the moral force behind this seat of holistic learning. With the construction and expressive soul, the teachers have always been providing the wings of adventure to chisel the different dimensions of the college. The college has been providing excellent service in the field of higher education in this predominantly rural and backward area in the district of Sangrur. This multifaceted co-educational post graduate college fulfils the educational needs of about fifty villages around Dhuri, Sangrur and Malerkotla in a radius of more than 40 kms.

At present, this college stands at its apex by virtue of being one of the greatest institute and has become the nucleus of academic centre in Commerce, Management, Science, Computer Science and Humanities. This college has B.A., B.Com.(Regular), B.A. B.Ed Integrated, B.Voc(Software Development), B.Voc(Retail Management and IT), B.Com., B.B.A., B.C.A., B.Sc.(Non Medical), B. Sc.(FT) and B. Sc.(Agriculture). The college also offers post graduate courses such as M. A. (English), M. A. (Punjabi), M. Sc(IT), P.G.D.C.A., M.Sc Maths, and M. Com.

Keeping pace with the latest development and changing demand of the market and society, the college authorities have the vision and power to introduce new streams and subjects. This college has a bright future. It will grow from strength to strength in the years to follow.

Institutional Strength

- The Governing body of the institution makes all the best possible efforts to recruit qualified and dedicated staff.
- The institution caters to the educational needs of both boys and girls.
- It is a Grant-in-Aid college
- The institution shapes the students in such a way that they get good academic positions.
- The college offers Graduate and Post graduate courses.
- The college also offers many professional courses such as B. Voc., BCA, BBA, B. Com., B.Com. (Hons.), PGDCA and M. Sc. IT.
- The college gives fee concession to the poor students and especially poor girl students are benefited from this scheme. From the current session college has granted half fee concession to girl students in the first year of all courses.
- Low fee structure. Fully wi-fi campus.
- The college also has the facility of INFLIBNET
- The Computer labs with LAN connectivity are available in the college campus.
- There are also well equipped Physics, Chemistry, Agriculture, Fashon Technology, Psychology and Geography labs.
- Guru Teg Bahadur Public School, Desh Bhagat Polytechnic College, Desh Bhagat College of Education, Mata Gujri Nursing College, Desh Bhagat Collegiate School are being run by the same Management.
- The College has indoor and outdoor sports facilities.
- NCC facility is also available and students are greatly benefitted by opting for NCC programme.
- The college also has two NSS units, one for boys and other for girls.
- The college has also produced some national/ international level personalities in cultural and sports activities.
- Seminars, Workshops and Conferences are one of the integral parts of the institution.
- The college feels a sense of pride because of the fact that alumni of the college are well placed.
- Many faculty members have received the benefit of faculty development programme by successfully completing their Ph.d and M.Phil. degrees.
- The college teachers and the non-teaching staff upgrade their ICT skills and accordingly improve themselves in doing activities with much proficiency.

Institutional Weakness

- Most of the students belong to the rural background, so they are not well versed in English Communication skills.
- Many students belong to the weaker sections of the society and they are dependent on Government scholarships
- .The institute has not developed any sound and efficient criteria to get Research Funded projects.

Institutional Opportunity

- The institution has been attracting the students for the last more than thirty years because of its sound strategic environment that provides the students with all types of basic and necessary facilities.
- The college provides quality education to the economically weaker but talented students.
- The infrastructure of the college is updated and modernized as per the needs of today's society.
- The college is successfully running various professional as well as post graduate courses that enable the students to secure jobs in different sectors.
- New professional courses like B.Voc and B.A. B.Ed Integrated courses have been introduced for bringing the students at par with the changing job prospects.
- Financial assistance includes salary grant of the teachers working under Grant-in-Aid posts from the Punjab Govt. UGC provides grants for the development of the infrastructure and other academic purposes such as organizing seminars, workshops and conferences etc.
- The institution also endeavours to catch up with the emerging trends in the field of education.
- The infrastructure is being modernized keeping in view the demands of the students and the disturbing factor of cut-throat competition.

Institutional Challenge

- There is overall reduction of grants for the development of higher education.
- Limited no. of posts under Grant-in-Aid scheme. The college has to pay salary of the teachers working on Grant-in-Aid posts from college funds because of the irregular grants.
- Posts sanctioned by Govt. do not match with the strength of students. The mushrooming of Institutions
 in nearby areas adds to difficulty for our institution as this development has led to the fall in strength of
 the institute.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The curriculum of the institute is designed by Punjabi University, Patiala but the goals and objectives of the college are transmitted to the students with the effort of the faculty members beyond classroom and curriculum. Desh Bhagat College Bardwal-Dhuri provides wide range of courses/programmes in Arts, Commerce, Science and Computer Science at Graduation and Post-Graduation level. In the last five years, Under Graduate courses i.e. BA-II(Sociology),B.Com-II,B.Com-III,BBA-III,BBA-III,B.Sc-FT-III, B.Sc-FT-III,B.Com(Prof.)-I, B.Com(Prof.)-II , B.Com(Prof.)-III,B.Sc(Agri.)-I , B.Sc(Agri.)-II , B.Sc(Agri.)-III , B.Sc(Agri.)-IV , MCM-II,MCM-III,Bsc(NM)-III, Bsc(NM)-III, B.Com-(Hon.)III , B.Com-(Hon.)III,B.Lib & Post Graduate courses i.e. MSc Maths ,M.Com. have been added.

Several faculty members take initiatives and contribute in designing the curriculum as members of the Board of Studies/Faculty, Punjabi University in different subjects. The college provides diverse and flexible courses in BA, B.Com.,B.Com(Hon.), BSc Non-Medical, BBA, B.Sc(Agri.), B.Lib,M.Com. and MSc Maths as has been prescribed by University. There is one diploma course, PGDCA of one year duration.

"Drug Abuse: Problems, Prevention and Management" as well as "EVS and Road Safety Awareness" are taught to students in II and IV semester respectively. A value added course of "Communication Skills" focuses on communication skill, aptitude ability, CV writing, over all personality development, Mock interviews etc. Free Sports coaching camps are organised to provide help to the sports persons. Students of BBA & B.Com (Hon.) go for a compulsory training during sixth semester .

The college strives to offer the quality education through evaluation by students and seeking feedback from the stakeholders. This helps in identifying the new programmes/subjects that can be introduced in the new session.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The main aim of Desh Bhagat College, Bardwal is to provide education which focuses on overall development of its students with qualified academicians. Higher education enables them to become independent. The principal has made an admission committee which consist teachers from different streams. This committee ensures that the students with different skills are able to join the institute and give their contribution to it with their different skills.

The procedure of admission is printed in the college prospectus, which is on college website. The college also gives benefits to SC, OBC, women, economically weaker sections, minorities communities in admission, In spite of this student profiles and academic results are very good. Good results are possible and achieved by highly qualified faculty recruited as per UGCguidelines. Teachers use traditional, advanced and progressive methods to make the study easy for students and motivate them to learn not only in classrooms but also other available supplementary reading materials and references, which are also available in college library and departmental libraries. The institution has 9 Phd and 10 M.phil faculty members.

Research, Innovations and Extension

One major and one minor project have been submitted by HOD of Commerce and Economics Department Dr. Balbir Singh after successful completion. There are 17 journal publications in various UGC notified journal during the last five years and 28 books/ papers published in National/International conference proceedings. There are 3 teachers including principal of the college eligible PhD guide. One of the candidates submitted successfully her PhD thesis under Principal Dr.Swinder Singh Chhina. The college promotes institute-neighborhood-community network and make efforts to encourage students to take part in various extension activities for the welfare of society and their individual growth. The College organized number of extension activities such as Re-Public day Parade, Blood Donation Camp, Tree Plantation, Lecture on Anti-Drug day, Celebration on Teej promoting "Beti Bachao Beti Padao etc. and also received appreciation many times for this contribution. The colleges also have 32 collaborations and linkages for resource sharing, internship, faculty exchange and promotion of research and also having 2 MOU signed with A.P. Organics, Dhuri and Viver Technologies, Malerkotla.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution has adequate facilities for teaching—learning viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc. The institution follows a well established policy to ensure that the available infrastructure is in

line with the academic growth of the institution. Excellent Class Rooms, Smart Class Rooms, Central Library, Departmental Libraries, SSR Lecture Theater are used for an effective Teaching & Learning Process. Well furnished Administrative office, Board Rooms, Head of Department Rooms and Staff Rooms of faculty, Seminar Halls, GD & Interview Rooms, Auditoriums, Laboratories, Placement Cell, Examination Cell, Comfortable sick rooms, Yoga & Meditation rooms are available for all the students and amenities like Gym, Internet, Library facilities for the Hostel Students. There is also availability of Indoor & Outdoor sports facilities for the progress of students. Bank along with ATM, Local Call System, Courier Service, Reprographics, Stationery Store etc are provided. Round the clock internet facility is available with lease line 10 Mbps speed for more than 150 computer and Wi-Fi connectivity. The library is partially computerized and the material is arranged according to DDC 22nd latest edition. The Library has INFLIBNET service for ejournal and e-books. Wi-Fi facility is available in the library with 50 Mbps speed. Library has rich collection of books, magazines and e-resources. International Software eLib-Syspro 1.0. has also been installed in the library and has access to e-resources like (e-books and journals) provided by UGC-INFLIBNET, N-List Program through which it provides access to about 4000 e-journals and more than 80,000 e-books. Inter library loan facility is also provided to readers. Library subscribes 30 printed periodicals (Journals and Magazines) and 11 Newspapers. Installation of solar panels lights to get the renewable use of energy resources. Adequate number of ICT enabled class room and tutorial rooms for each department. Well equipped Computer Science and other laboratories with exclusive machines and major equipments. Well built library with 16, 289/- books besides the digital library to access e-journals & e-books. An Excellent transport facility covers all areas of city and villages also.

Student Support and Progression

Desh Bhagat College Bardwal provides quality education to students of the area. Scholarships are given to the students of (schedule caste, minority) according to the norms of the government. The college also provides fee concession to the students specially to the girl students as in the current year fee concession was given to the girls of first semester.

The students are guided through counseling for the jobs in different fields according to their abilities. At present many students are working in different fields and receiving higher education. In sports fields, our students have great achievements in university level, National level, and International level.

Our old students are always in-touch with the college as they always take initiative to solve the financial problems of the economically weak students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has been working under the guidance of "Desh Bhagat College Bardwal Trust (Regd.), Dhuri" Under the guidance of the governing body and the Principal, the entire faculty of the college coordinates to implement the proposal and improve quality of education. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college provide placement and career information to the students. The Principal is Ex-Officio member of the college Trust. Principal has constituted various committees, cells and societies to implement policies and plans. The Academic Council, Registrar Office and Bursar Office are continuously assisting the Principal. The Bursar of the college advises the Principal regarding the proper utilization of the financial resources. The institute has provided autonomy to the teaching departments. The teaching Departments have freedom to organize seminars, workshops, and educational tours. The College has been moving forward in higher education with its vision and

mission. The long-term and short-term policy of the college is focused on academic and infrastructural development of the institution. Performance of teachers is evaluated and assessed on the basis of Self-Appraisal Performa filled by them every year at the end of academic session. Every employee performance is assessed after completion of one year of service. The internal audit is conducted by a Chartered Accountant duly appointed by the Desh Bhagat College Bardwal Trust. For external auditing, auditor comes from Punjab government to examine accounting and financial records. Students are admitted in self-financed courses as per the Punjab Government and Punjabi University prescribed Higher Education rules and regulations. The college comes under Grant-in-Aid Scheme in which college is getting salary Grants from Punjab Government for the sanctioned posts. Punjab Government provides grants for Scheduled caste students admitted in the college. The institution follows strategies for maintenance and improvement of quality assurance of all its education system, administration and co-curricular activities through IQAC.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- The College believes in promoting gender sensitization by conducting various activities throughout the year such as teej festival, direct interaction with successful women, youth festival, women's day celebration etc.

4. Quality Indicator Framework(QIF)

Criterion 1 - Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The institute makes its best efforts for effective curriculum delivery and transaction of curriculum provided by the university. Punjabi University designs the syllabus and makes it available to the college at the beginning of the session. It also defines the examination and assessment pattern. University also describes the date of beginning and ending of semester/session. Our institution organizes the following well marked out action plans for the effective implementation of the prescribed curriculum:

- Time Table: At the beginning of each academic session the Academic Calendar along with the time table of Arts, Commerce, Science and Computers streams is prepared according to the number of elective subjects and the options offered to the students and the same is displayed on the student's notice board. All the departments while deciding teaching work-load distribution pay due consideration to the specialized area of teachers, their experience and level of course to be handled.
- Creation of sections: The Time Table committees divide different classes into sections of appropriate strength for each subject.
- Classroom teaching: Term wise division of the syllabus already planned at the departmental level in the beginning is implemented in the best possible way. Teachers are assigned their schedule of work that includes the number of classes to be met. The teachers acquaint the students with the prescribed course content, texts and recommended books. They are also given information about the pattern of the university question paper for better understanding.
- **Teaching aid cell:** This cell of the college extends full cooperation to the teachers for improving their teaching practices by preparation and proper use of Smart Classrooms in which power point presentation and other Information and Communication Technology (ICT) facilities are available.
- **Problem solving and doubt clearing sessions:** Sufficient time is earmarked for solving the problems and clearing the doubts of students along with the successful completion of the curriculum.
- Optimum use of college library and Internet facility: Teachers use text books as well as resource books from library. Library and departmental book bank facilities are also provided to students. Students and teachers can access internet facility in the computer lab during their free time.
- Educational tours and trips: Educational tours and trips are organized for students of every department to different places like Universities, Industries, Science City, historical places etc. These visits not only broaden their mental outlook but also provide adequate
- exposure and knowledge to the students.
- Students' Interactive activities: To facilitate the learning process students are encouraged to actively participate in group discussions and seminars. Various projects are assigned to the students of professional classes to inculcate their interest in research activities.
- **Bilingual method of teaching:** As most of our students come from the rural background so the bilingual method of teaching is implemented to enable the students for better understanding.
- Class tests and assignments: Regular class tests are conducted along with Mid Semester Test.

Innovative teaching methods are adopted to provide all kind of information to the students. They are equipped and prepared in such a way that they are ready to face any kind of situation. The students participate in the class enthusiastically and present themselves as better equipped with latest knowledge and good analytical skills. House examinations are conducted to assess the knowledge of the students.

Slow learners are provided extra classes so that they can catch up with their counterparts. Process of selecting the weak students crates an ambient environment between the teacher and the taught. The college officials keep in touch with such students through calls. Meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

Internal evaluation process has been started by the college as per the guidelines and instructions set by the Punjabi University. Semester system of examination is followed in place of the annual system in which internal assessment is its integral part.

Internal evaluation process of the college consists of the following parts:

- Mid Semester Tests: Mid- Semester tests are conducted on departmental levels. A question paper of maximum 50 marks was prepared, out of which students have to secure 35% marks in order to clear their condition. After that parent teacher meeting is conducted to discuss the performance of students.
- Assignments: After completion of the topic in the class, teacher assigns assignment to the students. Students have to prepare the assignments from different reference books and internet so that teacher can evaluate them on their performance in assignment.
- Attendance requirement: There is requirement of attendance of 75% lectures in the class and 75% in practical class separately.
- **Practical Internal Evaluation:** Students are required to attend minimum 75% lectures. Practical evaluation is done on the basis of work performed by students during practical and in practical files.

Students who have participated in NCC, NSS, sports, youth festival, national and international competitions are provided additional time for submission of their assignments and practical work.

Internal assessment of the students is done as per the guidelines and instructions of the Punjabi University. The evaluation process of the students is done on the basis of his performance in class tests, assignments, attendance in the class and House Exams. Students are strictly evaluated keeping in view these parameters of evaluation that does not leave an iota of doubt amongst the students. Internal assessment of practical exam is also assessed in the same way. Students are assessed keeping in view the results obtained while conducting experiments in the labs and are evaluated as per their practical skills. At the end of each semester, teachers prepare internal assessment of each student and submit it to the College Registrar office. In the next step, these internal assessments of the students are uploaded on the University Internal

Assessment Portal and their hard copies are also sent to the university.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

The institute makes every possible effort to adhere to the academic calendar. Academic activities of the institute are regulated by academic calendar approved by Academic Council from time to time and made available to the faculty and all other concerned. It is mandatory for students/faculty to strictly adhere to the academic calendar for completion of academic activities. The committee consisting of the Principal, Academic council and the Registrar Examinations prepare the academic calendar well in advance before the commencement of the session. This calendar is prepared on the basis of instructions given by the university. Academic calendar is uploaded on the college website so that student will be aware of the admission dates with or without late fees, autumn break, winter break, commencement of semester study, Mid Semester Test (MST) schedule, University exams schedule and tentative schedule of extra-curricular activities.

Timetable in-charges of the college prepare the timetable as per the guidelines of respective courses prior to the commencement of the semester. Time-table is displayed on the notice boards.

Various admission committees are formed to admit the students in different programs offered by the

college. Members of these committees strictly scrutinize the documents of each student before admission. Students are admitted as per the schedule provided by the university.

As a tool of continuous internal evaluation, the Mid Semester Tests are held according to academic calendar. Internal assessment is given to the students on the basis of their marks in these tests. 75% of the syllabus is covered before the start of MST. Students who participate in NCC/NSS/Sports and Youth Festivals are given a special chance to appear in MST if they have missed it due to their activities. If the students miss the MST due to some ailment they are also given special chance after they provide medical certificate

Each department plans out its academic activities along with the curricular and co curricular activities as per the dates mentioned in the prospectus. To carry out these activities, various literary clubs and associations are formed.

Semester Examinations (Theory & Practicals) are conducted according to the schedule provided by the University. The teaching is suspended atleast fifteen days prior to the commencement of the examinations so that students get enough time to prepare for their exams. For these examinations, the external invigilation staff is deputed by the university. Results of the practical examinations as well as the internal assessment are submitted to the university as per the university schedule, so that there is no delay in the declaration of the results.

Departmental meetings and discussions are held and all schedule of improvement of academics are discussed to attain the Course outcome, Program outcome and Program specific outcome. Evaluation is done by the departments, for interpreting the data and verification accumulated through assessment practices. Evaluation determines the extent to which Program outcomes, Program Specific outcome and Course outcome are being achieved and results in decisions and actions to improve the program.

The program outcomes and Program Specific outcomes are assessed with the help of course outcomes of the relevant courses through direct and indirect methods. Direct methods are provided through direct examinations or observations of student knowledge or skills against measurable course outcomes. The knowledge and skills described by the course outcomes are mapped to specific problems on University Examination, internal exams and assignment. All the faculty members record the performance of the students on each course outcome.

The element of innovation is brought into focus by making them aware of the pros and cons of Chemicals like how a single chemical can be used for saving humanity or destroying it.

In the field of fashion technology, students are encouraged to design new patterns in embroidery, Tie and Dye, Block printing, Stencil Printing.

In the field of Agriculture, Students are practically guided to experiement on cross-breeding of the plants that sometimes bring innovative results. Students are guided to understand the diversification of the crop patterns .

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development during the last five years

Response:

Extension activities play an important role for the overall development of the students by sensitising them towards social issues. For the purpose, encouraging the student to participate in activities and programmes steered by NSS (National Service scheme), NCC (National Cadet Corps), Red Ribbon Club, Youth Welfare Club and KandPatrika, Old Student Association etc.to serve the community. In this way, educational institutes are the key element to establish institute-neighbourhoods—community network and contribute for the overall growth of the society and nation.

The college units of NSS organize camps in which lectures are delivered on various topics like environment issues, tree plantation, health and hygiene, cleanliness, traffic rules, women rights etc. Each year the volunteers work tirelessly around the college and within college campus and learn the valuable lesson of dignity and hard work. NSS units undertake activities that create social awareness and generate a sense of responsibility among the students .Organization of Blood donation camps is another important activity by institute. The faculty and the students celebrate various eminent days such as Literacy day, Teacher Day, Women day, world Aids day.Besides these days both National days are also celebrated with great enthusiasm at Dhuri with local community and local government.

Lectures/debates/rallies etc. are organised on burning social issues such as Female foeticide, Drug abuse, and importance of eligible voters in the electoral process on Voters day to raise the awareness of the students towards this. Also organised disaster management drills by raising fund for natural calamities.

NCC cadets apart from attending camps organized by their respective directorates, undertake training which makes them self-disciplined and self-reliant. An oath is taken to stand against social evils like dowry and female feticide, corruption, cleanliness etc.

A special concession in fees is given to the nearby local students belong to Bardwal, Babanpur and Issi village. The college always adopted various provisions to promote girl education. For example, the college had provided free bus services to local area girls in years 2013 to 15, then provided fee concession of Rs.1000 to girl students in next year with the objective to spread girl education. Except that college is always ready for the poor students with the objective of spreading higher education in the area during the last five years by allowing them to pay college fees in instalments if required, so that none is deprived of education because of financial constraints.

The **DESH BHAGAT COLLEGE BARDWAL, DHURI – SANGRUR, PUNJAB, INDIA** was established in1982 and is Affiliated from **Punjabi University, Patiala, Punjab** presently our College has 47 classrooms. Along with seminar halls, various labs like 07 Computer Science labs, Geography, Psychology, Physics, Chemistry, Fashion Technology and Life Science Labs like (Botany, Zoology, Horticulture and Agronomy) are also available for the enhancement of teaching and learning skills. There are specialized equipments for teaching & learning like 4 Multimedia projectors with Smart Board, projector & Interactive board. The whole campus is Wi-Fi enabled with internet leased line 10 Mbps bandwidth.

A Central library has been set up as a learning resource. To facilitate the students a Girls common rooms and a canteen has also been established. A placement cell is put in place to enable the students to avail opportunities for bright future. UGC Network Resource Centre & Teaching Aids Cells are also functional at college campus. There are 15 offices for different teaching departments. 16 CCTV cameras have been installed in the campus for effective surveillance. There is a branch of nationalized Punjab & Sind Bank with ATM for staff, students & others. A Vermicompositing unit, Botanical Garden and one rain water harvesting systems are built up in the college campus.

Our institution, which has a 10 acre playground, is adequately facilitated with sports and games. The college provides facilities for not only outdoor games like Football, Cricket, Volleyball, etc., but indoor games like Chess, Table Tennis, Weight lifting, etc., are also being played. From year 2002 Netball coaching centre is being run successfully. Netball players achieve good positions at State & National level.

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Sports Authority of India (SAI) set up a centre at our college in 2013 for various games like Kabaddi, Boxing & Basketball. Free evening centre for sports is open for all youngsters. Many sportspersons of this centre are being selected for police services. College provides refreshment & sports kit to sportspersons. Achievers in sports are honored and facilitated from time to time at college functions. Annual expenditure for sports activities in 2016 – 2017 was Rs. 1, 85, 170/-. For spiritual enrichment of students as well as local residents a meditation hall has been built which is available all the time in the Gurudwara Sahib. To promote yoga, a lawn has also been maintained at college campus

The institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities. An Open Air Theatre of 4000 sq. ft is available for outdoor cultural items. Two Outdoor Stages and Public Address system is being possessed by our institute. Students participate in Youth Festival, Inter College competitions at various levels like Zonal, Inter Zonal, State & National competitions. Annual expenditure for cultural activities for session 2016-2017 was Rs. 2, 37, 875/- and for session 2017-2018 Rs. 704038/-. For Extracurricular activities 2 units of NSS for boys & girls are active at college campus. NCC unit is also working in the college. The Youth Services Department (Punjab) has established a Youth Club for the holistic development of students.

The library has rich pool of reference books, national and international journals and e-sources, encyclopedia, biographies, newspapers and magazines etc. that are available in Punjabi, English and Hindi. The library is partially computerized and the material is arranged according to DDC 22nd latest edition. The Library has INFLIBNET service for ejournal and e-books. Wi-Fi facility is available in the library with 50 Mbps speed. Library has rich collection of books, magazines and e-resources. International Software eLib-Syspro 1.0. has also been installed in the library and has access to e-resources like (e-books and journals) provided by UGC-INFLIBNET, N-List Program through which it provides access to about 4000 e-journals and more than 80,000 e-books. Inter library loan facility is also provided to readers. Library subscribes 30 printed periodicals (Journals and Magazines) and 11 Newspapers. Open access system for both post graduates as well as under graduate students allows easy access of books. Laser printer cum scanner and photo copier are also available in library. Library also provides training / apprenticeship to the students of library and Information Science. This year also 05 students are undergoing training. Book bank facility is a unique feature of the institute where meritorious and economically weaker students are provided textbooks from the library. Every year a large collection of textbooks is added to the existing book bank of the library. Library committee ensures that the outdated, old edition books or text books no longer prescribed by the university are removed from the stock and latest editions are added to the book bank for the benefit of the students. Punjabi University, Patiala has opened Distance Library Centre in this college for those students who are taking education from Correspondence Course, Punjabi University, Patiala and students are free to take books from this library.

• The Budget Committee of the College plays an important role by receives budget estimates from all the Head of Departments & Co-coordinators for different purposes like Annual Athletic Meet,

Youth Festival, Lab Equipments, Sports Equipments, etc. After this process the budget get approved by the Principal and Managing Committee. A committee constituted for the effective utilization of the time.

- The managing committee of the college is always keen to improve the basic infrastructure and the institute is well equipped with the facilities that are required by students as well as the teachers.
- The annual expenditure for maintenance of the College infrastructure is Rs. 67 Lakhs for session 2016-17. The Maintenance Wing established in the college deals with systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. This wing directs to maintain and upkeep of the college campus.
- The Punjab and Sind Bank branch has also been setup with ATM and other necessary facilities.
- The upkeep and maintenance of the basic infrastructure and other technical gadgets is done regularly. Whenever any snag develops the college authority take the action quickly and arrange the technician to set the things right. All the computer labs are taken care of the technician.
- The college also has one electrician for maintenance of electrical equipments.
- The efforts are made regularly to beautify and sanitize the college campus. The cleanliness drive facilitate the hygienic surrounding by taking special care of parking areas, toilets, washrooms etc.
- Garden maintenance, landscaping and beautification of the campus are undertaken by the committee specially constituted for the purpose.
- The dispensary with First Aid Facility has also been established to meet the emergency needs of the teachers as well as students and other non teaching staff of the college.
- General cleanliness of all classrooms, labs, offices, Department rooms and corridors etc. is done by the staff appointed for this purpose under the supervision of the Office Superintendent.

Recurring Expenses

College provides salary to teaching and non-teaching staff with the collection of fees. Apart from this, college is also depositing university registration fees.

Infrastructural development facilities

The college trust prepares budget to construct and upgrade the infrastructural facilities in accordance with the modern trends. The institute gets grants from UGC for construction of buildings, purchase of modern lab equipments and purchase of latest version softwares. College provides transport services to girl students. To serve this purpose the college purchases new transport vehicles as per the requirements of student strength.

Seminars, Conferences and Faculty Development Programmes and other academic activities

The institute conducts the above mentioned activities regularly matching with the latest technology, innovations, research, changes and needs for the society. Modern sports complex has been created to provide sports opportunities to students. College allocates funds for purchases of Library books/journals, repair & maintenance, equipment & stationary and well-equipped smart classrooms. The institute organises the body fitness programmes for staff and students like Sports, N.C.C., N.S.S., Youth Festival, Blood Donation Camps. The finance committee spends required funds on these activities.

Environment and Green Initiatives

Today, pollution is biggest challenge which is affecting human lives. Enough care is taken to maintain pollution free campus for that college follows healthy Practices/ Eco friendly committee. On the Recommendation of healthy Practices/ Eco friendly committee, college is allocating funds for tree plantation and cleanliness initiatives.

The College has policy of bio waste management; college has set up a vermicomposting pit of 8*6. It has become the source of organic manure with the help of earthworms. This process of the manure making through these engineers of the earth (earthworms) helps in Solid Waste Management. The institution provides required training to its teaching and non-teaching staff. A time table committee has been formed. The committee sets the classes as per the convenience of the teachers. Regular workshops and seminars are organised by different departments to interact with resource persons/experts from institution of higher learning. General orientation of the staff is done at the beginning of session and semester through staff/department/committee meetings organized to discuss specific quality ensuring aspects pertaining to new examination practices, admission procedure and assessment guidelines,

introduction and implementation of new subjects ,courses, feedback methods , general office practices, academic and co-curricular activities etc.

To ensure smooth conduct of classes the Principal takes rounds on regular intervals. The Principal is receptive to all kind of communication from students and teachers alike. Arrangement of extra classes for weak students and remedial classes for competitive exams, especially for NET are conducted. Taking seminars is compulsory for PG classes examining students by internal tests assessment. We are uploading two examples for implementation of teaching learning reforms: As proposed by IQAC seven days' workshop with collaboration of Punjabi-Pedia of Punjabi university, Patiala on "Basic Computers and Internet Skills" was organized from 24.04.2018 to 30.04.2018 to provide training to teaching staff by the computer department. 60 teachers attended this workshop .The workshop got excellent response. The documents are attached.

• To improve teaching learning process, the use of information & communication

Technology has been improved quality of teaching in the college. ICT has gained groundswell of interest for students as well as teachers with ICTs are important tools to enable & support the traditional 'Teacher centric' method to modern' Learner centric' method. ICT tools are beneficial and more helpful in terms of imparting knowledge in a comprehensive and practical manner. Due to need arisen by modern technology IQAC advised the institute that added 15 windows-10 and 15 MS office to existing stock. The internet connection speed has been increased from 2mbps to 10 mbps(leased line) in the institute. With the proposal of IQAC 4 smart classrooms are constructed in the institute.

1.Safety and Security: Taking in mind the gender sensitivity, safety and security of girls for any institution is very important.

- In order to safe and secure environment to the girls, there are proctorial committees in our college. Female staff members along with male staff members have been deputed in the proctorial committees.
- No outsiders are allowed to enter the college premises.
- ID cards are mandatory for students for their entry into the college.
- College security is provided during university exams and NCC cadets also help during college functions.
- College also provides transportation facilities to the female students at nominal charges.

2.Counselling: We have specific committees comprised of staff members according to their expertise to guide students in their career, studies and even in their family problems. We have a 'Girls Welfare and Grievances Committee' comprising of female teachers, with whom girl students can discuss their problems

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regarding eve-teasing and home-violence.

3.Common room: Two separate common rooms have been allotted to the girls with attached washrooms. One Common room has been alloted in Commerce Department near Principal's Office and other in Arts Block. Both these rooms are well furnished.

Gender sensitivity ensures that women and men enjoy the same status and have an equal opportunity to exercise their human rights and realize their full potential, especially young women. Our objective is to provide quality education to girls of nearby rural areas in order to bridge the gap between men and women. For this our college has taken certain steps:-

- We provide scholarships and fees concession to students, especially to girl students so that they are not devoid of the right to education because of limited resources.
- We organize seminars to create awareness among girls about women rights, their health and hygiene and issues related to adolescence. We also organize 'Nukkad Nataks'(street plays) for addressing various social evils such as female foeticide and sexual harassment and make them aware about women rights.
- Young and dynamic successful women are invited in our college to have one to one talk with the students especially girls to motivate and to create awareness about women rights.
- Our college teams visit the schools of rural areas to motivate students especially girls for higher education. We ensure that girls who have taken admission in our college focus on the studies whole heartedly. In order to do so,we keep the track record of attendance as well as their class performance. If the college staff finds any unusual activity, we enquire about it from the students and sometimes call their parents and try to redress the problem so that student concentrates on his/her studies. College especially concentrate on girls of marginalised sections of society like SC, ST, OBC and minorities by providing them financial assistance through Centrally Sponsored Government Schemes. College has taken into consideration gender sensitivity even in the infrastructure of college. College has separate common rooms, separate toilets and washrooms as well as canteen for the girls.

7.1.5 Waste Management steps including:

- Solid waste management
- Liquid waste management

- Solid waste management: The College produces a lot of bio-degradable waste material in form of tree leaves, pruning of trees, cutting of grass etc. Waste collection bins are placed in different blocks and other places of the campus to collect the biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste components. In order to manage the solid organic waste, a vermicomposting pit of 8*6 near Green House has been constructed. There is also a farm yard manure behind the college stadium near botanical garden in which organic waste is converted into manure which is used in flower beds and lawns in the college. There is 100% ban on burning of any type of garbage.
- Liquid waste management: We do not have much liquid waste in the laboratories. Spent culturing

media and used cultures are discarded either through Vermicomposting and Farmyard manure. For sterilisation of chemicals and tap water, proper autoclaving method is used in Microbiology lab. Moreover, there are two sceptic tanks installed in the college campus to manage the liquid waste.

• E waste management: E-waste exists only in the shape of used CD's, DVD's, printer cartridges and that too in a small amount. With the increased use of e-mail and pen drives, the use of CD's and DVD's has become almost negligible. The printing cartridges are reused till they become non-functional. Old computer systems are sold to those dealers who upgrade them and sell them again in the market. Electronic wastes are reused through converting them into useful study models which give practical knowledge to students.

Water is a valuable natural resource but over the years due to climate changes, growing population and increased release of pollutants by industry in water resources has resulted into a serious water crisis generally in Punjab and particularly in Malwa region. The presence of arsenic in the water is very high in Malwa region. The water table is declining to an alarming level here. We have installed water harvesting system on scientific lines in the campus which recharge the rain water. The collected water is further utilised for irrigation purposes. The College has setup a rainwater harvesting plant alongside Commerce block in the campus. This initiative is taken keeping in view our dedication and commitment towards the social responsibility. The college takes care to reduce and eliminate wastage of water through timely repair and systematic maintenance of its water storage and distribution system.

- 1. **Promotion of Cycles**: Local students are motivated to use cycles instead of petrol driven vehicles for health, fitness, saving of petrol and precious foreign reserves, check on pollution and cleaner environment. To popularize the use of cycles, the college has waived off the parking fees on cycles. In addition to this, the college organises cycle rally time to time to acknowledge benefits of cycles.

The Institution maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions. Our college provides information to the public under RTI Act.

Financial: Records of fees as well as every expenditure is properly maintained and these are annually audited. Budgets for various activities are allocated and spent accordingly. On receipt of the fee amount a receipt with all the breakup details regarding the fees collected is given immediately to the students. Apart from the tuition fees, fees collected for university exam and arrear fee, a system generated fee receipt is provided to all the students. Fee concession is given to the meritorious and economically weak students.

Academic: An annual academic calendar is prepared according to the guidelines of Punjabi University, Patiala and followed. Academic Calendar is designed by Student Council with the help of all HODs and the Principal. Majority decisions taken by the Principal are during the HOD meets. Regular HOD meetings are conducted. Decisions taken during the HOD meetings are forwarded to all the faculties. Mid semester tests are conducted and the examination sheets after evaluating are shown to the students. Marks for the internal assessment are given according to the instructions of University and communicated to students through their accounts on the college website through their respective user ids and passwords. All the unit and model test answers scripts are given to the students by the respective staff with duly giving academic advice to improve their scores.
